



## President's Information Report October 2018

### AWARDS AND HONORS:

Dr. Gonzalo Perez was invited to be a panelist at the most recent WCET (WICHE Cooperative for Technologies) Annual Meeting. Dr. Perez joined Chad Bolser, Richard Nelson, and moderator Mollie McGill in a panel discussion titled Resilient and Resourceful. Rural Community Colleges a Lifeline to Many. The panel focused on challenges faced by rural community Colleges such as open access, expansive service areas, unreliable or non-existent connectivity, and hiring faculty members.

Lisa Daskocil had a brief mention of her work PEACE: Project for Empathy and Compassion Education in the book *The Neuroscience of Empathy, Compassion, and Self-Compassion*, ed. Larry Stevens and C. Chad Woodruff and published by Academic Press, Elsevier.

Aaron Tabor was successful in gaining continued funding from the National Institutes of Health (NIH) for the Bridges to Baccalaureate (B2B) program.

Aaron Tabor joined the Flagstaff Innovate Waste Challenge committee, joined the Flagstaff EcoRanch Advisory Board, and was re-elected as Board Chair for STEM City.

### INTERNAL NEWS/FYI:

The Marketing/PR Department, IT, Facilities, and the Office of the President worked together to update the trophy case in the Commons area at the Lone Tree Campus. A new graphic history of the College was installed along with a monitor that will allow the College to dynamically update the content of the display. In addition to the new display case, current District Governing Board members and Distinguished Service Award recipients were listed on the glass wall near the entrance to the Board Room and a new student focused display was installed near Financial Aid. A final installation will focus on faculty and employees of the year and should be complete by the end of the year.



Financial Aid is pleased to report that the College’s student loan 3-year default rate has dropped to 13.4%. This is the lowest default rate in CCC history. Financial Aid attributes the change in default rates over the last year to efforts by Sam Stroud to identify and contact students who have defaulted on loans and the work of Inceptia, a contractor that works with students to repay loans. There were also changes to the student loan application a few years ago that have helped students to understand the terms of their loans better and reduce default rates.

### SPECIAL EVENTS AND MEETINGS:

The Page Center “Get the Scoop” event hosted more than 65 current and prospective students who wanted to learn more about CCC Page courses and services. The CCC Page advising staff helped to coordinate the event. Dr. Nate Southerland was the Master Chili Scooper and Page security staff, Joan Kerr, was the ice cream scooper. Staff from Financial Aid, Student Development, TRiO, Dual Enrollment/HS2CCC, and adult basic education travelled to Page to assist students. Representatives from the NAU Educational Opportunity Centers Program and the Office of Navajo Nation Student Financial Assistance (ONNSFA) were also on hand to assist students.

Dr. Dudley Gardner, current CCC Visiting Scholar, gave two EDTalks at CCC Page. The talks were co-sponsored by the Glen Canyon Natural History Association. Both talks were well attended and Dr. Gardner wowed the audience with his knowledge and pictures of the prehistoric “homes” of the Colorado Plateau and the recent digs he has joined in Mongolia.

Financial Aid participated in three events to help high school students transition to College. They attended the Coconino High School FAFSA Night to provide personalized Financial Aid counseling; the Flagstaff High School Fund College Night to provide personalized Financial Aid Counseling for Spanish speaking families; and the Flagstaff High School Cash for College Night where they gave group presentations on the mobile FAFSA application process.

Anna Canning, English Faculty Member, has been heading up efforts to start a Common Read program at the College. The Common Read for 2018-2019 will be *Tribe* by Sebastian Junger. In the Fall 2018 semester, faculty members are adopting the text for use in their classes and a series of Common Read program events are planned with the first two events occurring in October. The first was a Ted Talk /Community Conversation video presentation of Mr. Junger discussing “Our Lonely Society Makes it Hard to Come Home From War.” CCC Readfeast was followed by a poetry workshop featuring Museum of Northern Arizona Poet in Residence Jodie Hollander.

In partnership with the Sunnyside Neighborhood Association and the Consulado Movil Mexicano (Mexican Consulate), the College hosted an ED Talk and public service event for Mexican Nationals. The Mexican Consulate gave an ED Talk focusing on the mission of the Consulate followed by an event the next day that allowed Mexican Nationals to assist members of the community. CCC Spanish Faculty member Katie Schwartz and students in her Spanish classes volunteered for the event and had amazing opportunities to practice their Spanish.

The College has been a very active partner in the Lunar Legacy project that focuses on highlighting Flagstaff's scientific role in the Apollo Moon Missions. Other partners include the Flagstaff Convention and Visitor's Bureau, Lowell Observatory, the USGS, and many others. In October, the College participated in or hosted several events as part of the eighteen-month long Lunar Legacy celebration. Kevin Schindler, a historian with Lowell Observatory, gave an ED Talk on the Fourth Street Connection to the Moon Mission. The College sponsored the Flagstaff premiere of the movie *First Man*. Finally, the Lone Tree Campus hosted the Lunar Legacy Lecture Series focused on Flagstaff's role in pioneering endeavors from mapping the moon to providing simulated moonscapes for astronaut training, preservation of historical artifacts, and the continued world-class research occurring in Flagstaff and Arizona surrounding lunar and space exploration. Panelists for the talk were Tent Hare, USGS; Jim Skinner, USGS; Mark Robinson, ASU, and Ray Jordan, USGS retiree.

Academic Affairs featured the CCC Student Publications *Curios* and *OnCourse* at READ Feast. The event included music, art, poetry, an author book sale, magic, and food. CCC students and local artists read their work from *On Course* and *Curios*.

Student Development hosted two Transfer Boot Camps for students wishing to transfer to Arizona State University or the University of Arizona. Representatives from both universities joined CCC students to talk about transfer process and scholarships.

To honor National Hispanic Heritage Month, Student Development hosted Ofrenda 101: Día de los Muertos. During the event, Nuestras Raíces members discussed the meaning, history and customs of Día de los Muertos. The discussion included building an ofrenda, discussing the significance of each item on the ofrenda, and gave the audience an opportunity to ask questions. Nuestras Raíces members who participated were Theresa Muñoz, Delia Muñoz, Julia Canizales and Becca Ceballos-DeLap.

The College hosted the 2018 Community Transition fair. The event showcased options for students transitioning from high school to post-secondary education, educational programs and services, employment, adult services and agencies, and strategies for success.

Student Development and the Associated Student Body of CCC hosted the first ever STEM Forum. The event featured a speech from CCC Associate Provost, Gonzalo Perez, and offered information tables for STEM related programs.

Disability Resources hosted the ninth annual Community Transition Fair with over 100 high school students from five high schools in attendance and thirty vendors providing information. The students also had opportunity to take part in various breakout sessions and learn about services available to them.

Nate Southerland, Emily Lizotte, Aaron Tabor, Kimberly Batty-Herbert, and Andy Allen have created a series of courses for the Arizona Conservation Corps (AzCC). These courses will be offered in Spring and Summer 2019.

Academic Affairs developed two new bioscience courses (BIO 131 and BIO 132) which were approved by the Curriculum Committee.

#### **PARTICIPATION IN REGIONAL, STATE, AND NATIONAL HIGHER EDUCATION ORGANIZATIONS:**

Ali Applin participates in regular meetings of the Arizona Community College Communicators. The October meeting focused on sharing ideas between the Marketing directors of Arizona Community Colleges on how to promote the importance of Community Colleges in Arizona to the Governor and the Legislature.

Kate Kozac attended the TPSE Math meeting to talk about Data Science and the ArizMATYC meeting. The StatPREP grant leadership team met in October to develop a strategic plan for a grant. Kate is also in the preliminary stages of working with NAU to developing a transfer degree in Data Science.

Kate Kozak (Mathematics), Girija Dasmahapatra (Chemistry) and Kurt Yuengling (Geology) attended state Articulation Task Force (ATF) meetings. ATF meetings help ensure that the College's courses transfer easily to other higher education organizations in the state.

Kimberly Batty-Herbert attended the National Symposium on Student Retention in Salt Lake City.

Nate Southerland and Kimberly Batty-Herbert attended a multiday training session and are now certified as Peer Reviewers for the Higher Learning Commission.

Aaron Tabor and Kimberly Batty-Herbert participated in the Flagstaff Leadership Program. The October program highlighted local government and included a tour of the 911 call center and Coconino County jail.

Nate Southerland and Aaron Tabor met with Maribeth Watwood, Dean of the NAU Graduate College to discuss an "adjunct faculty pipeline". CCC currently employees many NAU graduate students and is attempting to create a pipeline to fill addition adjunct faculty needs for the college.

#### **PARTNERSHIPS:**

Ali Applin participated in a Flagstaff Convention and Visitor's Bureau stakeholders meeting representing the College. CCC was specifically recognized at this meeting as being an integral partner in the City of Flagstaff's Lunar Legacy program. Ali also met with Erika Mazza, Executive Director, and Kate Morely, of NAIPTA about possible opportunities to provide transportation to Native American communities and the Blue Ridge area. The group also discussed collaborating on commercial driver's license (CDL) programs.

As part of the College's program to recycle computers that have passed the life-cycle of usefulness for CCC students, faculty and staff, the College donated six computers to the Literacy Center of Arizona. The College routinely donates older computers to organizations that use them for educational purposes. Some schools and organizations that have received computers from CCC are the Flagstaff, Page, Grand Canyon and Williams unified school districts; Northland Preparatory Academy; Flagstaff Junior Academy; Flagstaff Community Christian School; the Coconino Association for Vocations, Industry and Technology (CAVIAT); and now The Literacy Center. Doug King, Project Management Facilitator, has been responsible for managing the donation program.

### CCC partners with Havasupai Tribe for GED exam prep

**N**ine people, ages 17 to 45, sat in the community center, not knowing what to expect.

But they knew that they decided to come because they wanted to take the next step to get their General Education Development (GED) certificate.

"I told them if they have the opportunity for a GED, they should take it," said Carlos Powell Sr., Early Head Start Director on the Havasupai Reservation.

On July 19 and 20, four members of Coconino Community College (CCC) went down to the village to offer an orientation meeting for the first class of students interested in getting their GED. The effort, it is hoped, will grow in the coming months. The effort, made through CCC's Adult Education program that is funded in part by a grant from the U.S. Department of Education administered by the state, is meant to offer more opportunities for tribal members.

"We want to create more opportunities for the Havasupai people by making education more accessible," said Gonzalo Perez, Associate Provost at CCC.

The purpose of this orientation was to test the new students on their current knowledge and what deficiencies they may have to help them successfully complete the exams required for receiving a GED, Perez said. Additionally, CCC Information Technology specialists upgraded all the computers with software required for the students to study course material. Stations are available at the Head Start office and at the community center in the

village, but students can also access their coursework from home.

Perez added that students are expected to take about eight weeks to finish course work in English, Reading and Math.

Powell will monitor the students and help keep them on track to reach their goals. Additionally, he or an assistant will be on hand Tuesdays and Wednesdays at either the Head Start office or the community center to help the students with problems or to navigate the course software.

Powell said that although he doesn't know exact numbers on how many members of the 600-member tribe haven't graduated from high school, he was confident that the need was significant enough to warrant the program.

He put the word out in June and got an immediate response. A total of 11 students registered in the first class and another class is planned for early September.

"We hope to have it to grow and see how many people we can walk through this, and show them that it can happen," Powell said. "It is definitely needed here. I want to see the parents be successful... You're never too old for education, and once you get that education, no one can take it away from you."

Perez said that, in addition to opening up tribal members to the possibility of better jobs, it also opens them up to the possibility of going to college—something that had never been an option before. Perhaps there might be a certification or associate degree in construction, nursing or IT.

# Read Feast celebrates human experience through literature, art, song

**H**er words seem to sing; a certain cadence develops in voice as a reader utters the words.

*"If only I were more like my dark horses, I wouldn't have to worry all the time that I was running too little and resting too much."*

Colorado-based Jodie Hollander, poet-in-residence at the Museum of Northern Arizona, stresses meter and form when she talks about her poetry, and she will be sharing her knowledge during two events at Coconino Community

College. On Oct. 9, she will join a lineup of local writers and artists to celebrate the human experience at the CCC Read Feast. And on Oct. 11, she will offer a poetry workshop at the college to students and community members.

### READ FEAST

Hollander said she was delighted to join the Read Feast lineup.

"I think it's really important, particularly people who don't have a lot of experience with poetry, to experience poetry they can really relate to, and see that it doesn't always have to be academic, difficult and daunting," she said.

The Read Feast is a celebration of local art and the essential role it plays in our lives, said Sandra Dählmann, English faculty at CCC. She added that the event offers a variety of disciplines that showcase local talent and work published in CCC's two student-produced publications - Curios and OnCourse.

"We want to support our local artists and bring together our community in one night of fun entertainment," Dählmann said.

The venue will feature art by local artists, music, dance, magic and readings by contributors to Curios and OnCourse as well as readings by local writers, including the voices of Ann Cummins, Arnette McGivney, Jeremy Martin, Jesse Sensibar, Nicole Walker and Hollander.

Hollander said she strives to relate to people new to poetry.

"I often find people who come to my poetry readings enjoy it more than they expected to," Hollander said.

And, maybe, others will consider writing their own poetry, Hollander added. Themes she writes about include family dynamics, grief, illness, loneliness and nature - things that large amounts of people can relate to. Accessibility is her aim.

She focuses on writing in a manner that is clear and that communicates. Her poetry is not experimental.

"I'm trained in meter and form, so the music of the poetry is extremely important to me," Hollander said.

If people can have musical experience with poetry, with sounds that are ear pleasing, that experience will be more enjoyable to them.

### POETRY WORKSHOP

Dählmann said that Curios and OnCourse are currently accepting submissions for the next issue, due out in May 2019. The theme for the publications will be "Belonging," and it is made in connection with the CCC Common Read program for the 2018-19 academic year. CCC Common Read shares a book across the college community to promote dialogue on important topics.

In its inaugural iteration, CCC Common Read is focusing on Sebastian Junger's book, "Tribe: On Homecoming and Belonging," about the experiences of the men and women of the U.S. Armed Forces as they come home and try to rejoin civilian life.

Hollander, during her workshop on Oct. 11, will lead the workshop along the theme of "Belonging."

Hollander said she takes the opportunities whenever she can to give back and expose people to something they might love.

"And it's very gratifying to be able to share with others and to maybe spread my enthusiasm," Hollander said.
